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Letter from the **Executive Director**

I am pleased to present Central
Rappahannock Regional Library's Annual
Report for Fiscal Year 2025. This report
provides the Library's stakeholders
throughout Spotsylvania, Stafford, and
Westmoreland counties and the City of
Fredericksburg with a snapshot of how the
library meets the growing needs of the region
by improving lives through the transformative
power of information, learning, and ideas.

Central Rappahannock Regional Library was created 56 years ago and continues to stand as a model for regionalism locally and in the Commonwealth. It is positioned to assist with the strategic priorities of the funding jurisdictions--most notably, providing quality educational opportunities and in building community.

The Library employs 237 local residents who have a tremendous impact on the communities they serve. Through their work of inspiring lifelong learning for everyone in the community, they fulfill customer requests and provide access to educational opportunities, technology training, and unique experiences, all while maintaining quality service in the face of rising costs.

Area residents continue to rely on their Library for reading and research materials, computers, and gathering spaces that their tax dollars fund, as demonstrated by the increased number of library card holders. Usage of the library is increasing in many areas, including the circulation of eMaterials, use of library computers, meeting and study rooms, and attendance at library classes and events.

As I celebrate the conclusion of my first year as the Library's Executive Director, I am looking forward to another year of collaborating with the jurisdictions to ensure that the Library is able to provide the outstanding customer service and educational opportunities that customers expect from their local public library system.

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Highlights

Branches Mark Milestone Anniversaries of Public Service

Salem Church Branch celebrated 30 years of serving the public on Thursday, September 19, 2024. In its first week of operation in September 1994, the branch checked out 16,000 books, videotapes, and CDs. This branch was the first in the county to provide public meeting rooms, including a 140-seat theater. Located on a busy road with numerous homes and businesses nearby, Salem Church Branch remains one of Central Rappahannock Regional Library's most-used locations.

On Tuesday, June 17, 2025, the Library's Abraham and William Cooper Memorial Branch in Colonial Beach celebrated 25 years of service. A major renovation in 2000 increased its size to 4,720 square feet, which includes a meeting room that holds up to 50 people.

Aimée Dillon, Westmoreland Branch Services Manager, shared: "Known for its charm and welcoming atmosphere, Cooper Branch is a place where children enjoy storytimes and other engaging events, toops

other engaging events, teens gather at the video gaming center, and adults love having a meeting room to visit with friends at programs..."

Both Salem Church and Cooper branches held cakeand-punch receptions for visitors throughout the day, with special recognition ceremonies in the late afternoon.







Library Board Votes to Extend Evening Hours at Spotsylvania Branches

At its June 9, 2025, meeting, the Board of Trustees of Central Rappahannock Regional Library approved expanded hours for its Spotsylvania County branches to include additional evenings, effective Monday, August 4, 2025.

"This is a major win for the citizens of Spotsylvania County," said Lori Hayes, Lee Hill District Supervisor and member of the Library Board of Trustees. "We're thrilled to be able to offer the extended access our community deserves. I want to thank my colleagues on the Library Board for their support in making this possible."


Summer and Winter Reading Challenges

The Library sponsors a number of reading challenges throughout the year to encourage maintaining and growing a healthy reading habit. Without a doubt, the two most popular are the all-ages Summer Reading challenge and the adult Winter Reading challenge.

Readers log books or minutes read, whether on a computer or on paper or on a device via the popular Beanstack app, earning virtual badges and chances to win donated prizes that appeal to book lovers.

While reading is naturally front and center, the Winter and Summer challenges also encourage participants to enjoy seasonal activities offered at the Library. Children and teens enjoy library visits and can have Lunch at the Library, with free, nutritious lunches provided courtesy of Library regional partners.

Privacy Pods for Public Use

In addition to more traditional meeting room spaces, the new option of privacy pods came to six library branches in 2024. Privacy pods take up minimal space but can be used by one to four individuals, depending on the model, for study, virtual meetings, telehealth appointments, job interviews, and other meetings.

Privacy pods at Fredericksburg, Salem Church, and Porter branches are made possible by a generous donation from the trust of Christopher Finley and Mary Campbell Finley. Pods at all three Westmoreland County branches are provided with support from the Library of Virginia and a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services.


